





1st June-31st August Update

In the first three months since receiving our support from the Brothers Trust, Peak has been able to move from a part time to a full time service.

Please see a review of our activity over this period

- 332 hours of operational activity broken down into 150 hours of direct contact support to young children with autism, parents, and school staff. 70 hours of documentation preparation which has resulted in mediations/tribunals being won in the child's favour for school placement and educational healthcare plan funding to provide 1-1 support. 72 hours in parental and school liaison organising and responding to parental enquires. 20 hours of promotional and accreditation work to enhance the awareness of the charity and provide a wider set of support. 20 hours of dedicated funding research, application, and meetings to increase and maintain the charities financial stability in the long term.
- 4 full day parental workshops conducted supporting over 40 families over the course of these 3 days
 with 1-1 direct support ranging from counselling parents struggling to deliver academic engagement
 strategies, Health and medical advice, behaviour management strategies, educational funding and
 diagnosis support.



Additional Activity Snapshot

- 6 Educational Health care plans created or updated which helped allocate no less than £90,000 worth of educational support funding for children with autism ranging from them receiving 1-1 key workers, participating in therapy support programs and speech and language therapy.
- 1 family supported in gaining their diagnosis for their child
- 7 assessment mediations won for families allowing their child to be assessed for financial support.
- 4 Annual reviews attended supporting families to maintain or increase the child's support.
- 21 parental and school mediations conducted ranging from repairing parent and school relationships, suggesting alternative management strategies to support the child, over turning permanent exclusions and obtaining school placements for children.
- 1 Summer respite program for autistic children and their siblings. Staff were funded by peak
 allowing working or struggling parents to receive respite while children engaged in Forest School
 activities.
